**I. SUMMARY**

This notice establishes the final Fiscal Year (FY) 2010 formula allocations to States for refugee Social Services under the Refugee Resettlement Program (RRP). The notice reflects allocations to States based on FY 2008 and FY 2009 refugee arrivals data (October 1, 2007, through September 30, 2009) and data submitted to ORR by States and matched by ORR against the Refugee Arrivals Data System (RADS).

**II. APPLICATION**

A State must have an approved Annual Services Plan, which is part of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) approved ORR-6 Performance Report, OMB No. 0970-0036, developed on the basis of a local consultative process, as required by 45 C.F.R. 400.11(b)(2), in order to use the formula Social Services funds described in this final notice. In order to use formula Social Services funds for Cuban and Haitian entrants, a State must indicate in its State Plan that Cuban and Haitian entrants will be served and must have an approved Cuban and Haitian Entrant Program (CHEP).

**III. ELIGIBLE POPULATIONS**

Eligibility for Refugee Social Services includes refugees, asylees, Cuban and Haitian entrants (including Cuban Medical Professional Parolees), certain Amerasians from Vietnam who are admitted to the U.S. as immigrants, certain Amerasians from Vietnam who are U.S. citizens, victims of a severe form of trafficking who receive certification, eligibility or interim assistance letters from ORR and certain other specified family members, and Iraqi and Afghan Special Immigrants, See 45 C.F.R. 400.43 and ORR State Letter No. 00-17 (September 14, 2000) on

eligibility for ORR programs. Also, see ORR State Letter No. 01-13 (May 3, 2001) on the Trafficking Victims Protection Act, as modified by ORR State Letter No. 02-01 (January 4, 2002), ORR State Letter No. 04-12 (June 18, 2004), and ORR State Letter No. 10-05 (March 19, 2010). In addition, see ORR State Letters No. 08-04 (January 18, 2008), No. 08-06 (February 7, 2008), No. 09-02 (October 14, 2008), No. 09-17 (April 9, 2009), and No.10-02 (December 23, 2009) on Iraqi and Afghan Special Immigrant eligibility. The term “refugee,” used in this notice for convenience, is intended to encompass all such additional persons who are eligible to participate in refugee program services.

#### **IV. SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION**

##### **Amounts for Allocation**

The Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) has \$154,005,000 in FY 2010 Refugee Social Service funds, as appropriated under the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-117).

The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2010 reads as follows:

“For necessary expenses for refugee and entrant assistance activities authorized by section 414 of the Immigration and Nationality Act and section 501 of the Refugee Education Assistance Act of 1980, for carrying out section 462 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002, section 235 of the William Wilberforce Trafficking Victims Protection Reauthorization Act of 2008, and the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000, for costs associated with the care and placement of unaccompanied alien children, and for carrying out the Torture Victims Relief Act of 1998, \$730,928,000, of which up to \$9,814,000 shall be available to carry out the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000: *Provided*, That funds appropriated under this heading pursuant to section 414(a) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, section 462 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002, section 235 of the William Wilberforce Trafficking Victims Protection Reauthorization Act of 2008, and the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 for fiscal year 2010 shall be available for the costs of assistance provided and other activities to remain available through September 30, 2012.”

The House Report (H. RPT. 111-220) states:

"The Committee provides \$154,005,000 for Social Services, which is the same as the fiscal year 2009 funding level and the budget request. Funding is distributed by a combination of formula and discretionary grants to states and non-profit organizations and supports a variety of services for refugees including employment preparation, job placement, social adjustment services, interpretation and translation services, English language training, and childcare.

Within the funds provided, the Committee includes \$19,000,000 for continued support to communities with large concentrations of Cuban and Haitian entrants of varying ages whose cultural differences make assimilation especially difficult, justifying a more intense level and longer duration of Federal assistance...."

ORR will allocate the \$154,005,000 appropriated for FY 2010 for Social Services as follows:

- \$84,787,090 is to be allocated using a two-year population (FY 2008 and FY 2009) as Social Services formula awards, as set forth in this notice, for the purpose of providing employment services and other needed services to refugees.
- \$19,000,000 is to be awarded for continuation awards of grants to serve communities most heavily affected by recent Cuban and Haitian entrant and refugee arrivals.
- \$15,000,000 is to be awarded for new awards for educational support to schools with a significant proportion of refugee children, consistent with previous support to schools heavily impacted by large concentrations of refugee children.
- \$23,942,910 is to be awarded separately from this notice through discretionary awards to States and non-profit organizations for continuation of awards made in prior years.
- \$11,275,000 is to be awarded as new Social Service discretionary grants under - competitive grant announcements issued separately from this final notice. -

## V. REFUGEE SOCIAL SERVICE FUNDS

The population figures used for the final FY 2010 Social Services formula allocation include refugees, Amerasians from Vietnam, Cuban and Haitian entrants, Havana Parolees, asylees, and victims of severe forms of trafficking for FY 2008 and FY 2009. The final FY 2010 formula allocation notice also includes Cuban Medical Professional Parolees and Iraqi and Afghan Special Immigrants. These population figures reflect the most recent and accurate information on refugee arrivals and on secondary migrants, asylees, and entrant data submitted by States. (See *Section IX. Basis of Population Estimates.*)

The Director allocates \$84,787,090 to States on the basis of each State's proportion of the national population of refugees who arrived in the U.S. during the most recent two-year period before the beginning of FY 2010 (including a floor amount for States that have small refugee populations). Of this amount, approximately **\$7 million** is awarded to Wilson/Fish Alternative Projects providing social services.

States were requested in the ORR State Letter No. 10-01 (November 24, 2009) to submit their State-generated asylee and entrant data and secondary migration data for refugees and entrants

who have resided in their State for the three-year period prior to October 1, 2009, to the ORR web-based data submission system for the purpose of data records matching for the FY 2010 Social Service formula allocations. States were informed that the website would be open for file submission from January 11, 2010, through February 8, 2010, and that this would be the only time period for States to submit data for the FY 2010 Social Services formula allocations and for the secondary migration report. The one-time-only data submission period, January 11, 2010, through February 8, 2010, was established to ensure adequate time for records matching and for timely publication of the final notice for the Social Services formula allocations for FY 2010.

In preparation for FY 2010 Social Services formula allocations, States were requested to submit to [gayle.smith@acf.hhs.gov](mailto:gayle.smith@acf.hhs.gov) by COB December 11, 2009, the name, e-mail address, and telephone number for a primary and an alternate user of the ORR website system (ORR State Letter No. 10-01 (November 24, 2009)). The State's identified primary and alternate users received instructions prior to January 11, 2010, on the use of the web-based data submission system for providing asylee and entrant data for Social Services, as well as secondary migration data for refugees and entrants, to ORR.

ORR receives data from USCIS in Miami for Havana Parolees, Cuban and Haitian entrants and Cuban Medical Professional Parolees. States that receive Cuban or Haitian entrants as border crossers or through ports of entry other than Miami, Florida, also had the opportunity to submit data between January 11, 2010, and February 8, 2010, to ORR regarding entrants served in their programs. These data were received by ORR and matched against ORR's Refugee Arrivals Data System (RADS). The results of the match are reflected in the final allocations.

As established in the FY 1992 Social Services notice published in the *Federal Register* on August 29, 1991, section I, "Allocation Amounts" (56 Fed. Reg. 42745 (August 29, 1991)), a variable floor amount for States that have small refugee populations is calculated as follows: If the application of the regular allocation formula yields less than \$100,000, then –

- (1) a base [floor] amount of \$75,000 is provided for a State with a population of 50 or fewer refugees who have been in the U.S. three years or less; and
- (2) for a State with more than 50 refugees who have been in the U.S. three years or less:
  - (a) a floor has been calculated consisting of \$50,000 plus the regular per capita allocation for refugees above 50 up to a total of \$100,000 (in other words, the maximum under the floor formula is \$100,000);
  - (b) if this calculation has yielded less than \$75,000, a base amount of \$75,000 is provided for the State.

The allocation formula floor of \$75,000 for States with very small annual arrivals provides funding for the minimal structure for a State to provide employment and other social services necessary for successful resettlement in American communities.

## **VI. POPULATIONS TO BE SERVED AND ALLOWABLE SERVICES**

Eligibility for refugee social services includes persons who meet all requirements of 45 C.F.R. 400.43. (See *Section III. Eligible Populations.*) In addition, persons granted asylum are eligible for refugee benefits and services from the date that asylum was granted (ORR State Letter No. 00-12 (June 15, 2000), as clarified by ORR State Letter No. 00-15 (August 3, 2000)). Victims of a severe form of trafficking who have received a certification, eligibility or interim assistance letter from ORR and certain other specified family members are eligible from the date on the certification letter (ORR State Letter No. 01-13 (May 3, 2001)), as modified by ORR State Letter No. 02-01 (January 4, 2002), ORR State Letter, No.04-12 (June 18, 2004), and ORR State Letter No. 10-05 (March 19, 2010). In addition, Iraqi and Afghan Special Immigrants are eligible for refugee benefits and services (see ORR State Letter No. 08-04 (January 18, 2008), ORR State Letter No. 08-06 (February 7, 2008), ORR State Letter No. 09-17 (April 9, 2010), and ORR State Letter No. 10-02 (December 23, 2009). (ORR State Letters may be found at [http://www.acf.hhs.gov/programs/orr/policy/orr\\_policy.htm](http://www.acf.hhs.gov/programs/orr/policy/orr_policy.htm)).

Services to refugees must be provided in accordance with the rules of 45 C.F.R. Part 400 Subpart I -- Refugee Social Services. Although the allocation formula is based on the most recent two-year refugee population, States may provide services to refugees who have been in the country up to 60 months (5 years), with the exception of referral and interpreter services and citizenship and naturalization preparation services for which there is no time limitation (45 C.F.R. 400.152(b)). Under section 8120 of Pub. L. No. 111-118, Department of Defense Appropriations Act, 2010, Afghan and Iraqi Special Immigrants are now eligible for ORR benefits and services **for the same time period as refugees**, beginning on their date of entry to the U.S. or date of adjustment of status if applying from within the U.S. for Special Immigrant Status.

Allowable social services are those indicated in 45 C.F.R. 400.154 and 400.155. Requests to provide additional services not included in these sections must be submitted to, and approved by, the Director of ORR, as required under 45 C.F.R. 400.155(h).

## **VII. SERVICE PRIORITIES**

In accordance with 45 C.F.R. 400.147, States are required to provide social services to refugees in the following order of priority, except in certain individual extreme circumstances: (a) all newly arriving refugees during their first year in the U.S. who apply for services; (b) refugees who are receiving cash assistance; (c) unemployed refugees who are not receiving cash assistance; and (d) employed refugees in need of services to retain employment or to attain economic independence. In order for refugees to leave Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) quickly, States should, to the extent possible, ensure that all newly arriving refugees receive refugee-specific services designed to address the employment barriers that refugees typically face.

ORR encourages States to re-examine the range of services they currently offer to refugees. Those States that have had success in helping refugees achieve early employment may find it

possible to expand beyond the provision of basic employment services and to address the broader needs that refugees have in order to enhance their ability to maintain financial security and to integrate successfully into the community. Other States may need to reassess the delivery of employment services in light of local economic conditions and develop new strategies to improve services to newly arriving refugee groups.

ORR also makes Social Services formula funds available to pay for services that are provided to refugees who participate in Wilson/Fish projects (see Note 2, Table 1). Wilson/Fish projects can be administered by public or private non-profit agencies, including refugee, faith-based and community organizations. Section 412(e)(7)(A) of the Immigration and Nationality Act provides that:

“The Secretary [of HHS] shall develop and implement alternative projects for refugees who have been in the United States less than thirty-six months, under which refugees are provided interim support, medical services, support [social] services, and case management, as needed, in a manner that encourages self-sufficiency, reduces welfare dependency, and fosters greater coordination among the resettlement agencies and service providers.”

This provision is generally known as the Wilson/Fish Amendment. ORR issued a separate grant announcement for applications for such projects. The notice can be found at the ORR website at <http://www.acf.hhs.gov/grants/open/foa/view/HHS-2010-ACF-ORR-RW-0051>.

States are encouraged to consider eligible sub-recipients for Social Services formula funds, including public or private non-profit agencies such as refugee, faith-based and community organizations.

## VIII. ALLOCATION FORMULAS

Of the funds available for FY 2010 for social services, **\$84,787,090** is allocated to States in accordance with the formula specified below.

A State's allowable formula allocation is calculated as follows:

1. - The total amount of funds determined by the Director to be available for this purpose; divided by
2. - The total number of refugees, Cuban and Haitian entrants, parolees, Amerasians from Vietnam, Havana Parolees, Cuban Medical Professional Parolees, and Special Immigrants, as shown by the ORR Refugee Arrivals Data System (RADS) for FY 2008 and FY 2009, and victims of severe forms of trafficking, as shown by

the certification, eligibility and interim assistance letters issued by ORR, who arrived in the United States not more than two (2) years prior to the beginning of the fiscal year for which the funds are appropriated. This total also includes the total number of asylees who have been served by States through the refugee resettlement or social services system in FY 2008 and FY 2009. The resulting per capita amount is multiplied by –

3. - The number of persons in item 2, above, in the State as of September 30, 2009, adjusted for verified secondary migration.

The calculation above yields the formula allocation for each State. Minimum allocations for States with low numbers of arrivals are also determined by the allocation formula.

## **IX. BASIS OF POPULATION ESTIMATES**

The population figures used in FY 2010 for final formula allocations to States for refugee social services are based on data on refugee arrivals for FY 2008 and FY 2009 from the ORR Refugee Arrivals Data System (RADS), as of September 30, 2009, adjusted for verified secondary migration. The database includes refugees, Amerasians from Vietnam, Cuban and Haitian entrants, Havana Parolees, Cuban Medical Professional Parolees, asylees, and Iraqi and Afghan Special Immigrants. Data on trafficking victims are taken from the total number of trafficking victims' certification, eligibility and interim assistance letters issued by ORR. ORR makes additional adjustments for asylees and entrants reported by States as receiving services in FY 2008 and FY 2009 as verified by ORR.

As previously stated, ORR Social Services formula final allocations for States for FY 2010 are based on the numbers of refugee arrivals, Amerasians, Cuban and Haitian entrants, Havana Parolees, Cuban Medical Professional Parolees, asylees, Iraqi and Afghan Special Immigrants, and victims of a severe form of trafficking. A decision was made to base refugee numbers upon the arrivals during the preceding two fiscal years, FY 2008 and FY 2009, as of September 30, 2009, instead of the most recent three fiscal years, adjusted for secondary migration. Using only the most recent two-year arrival data will permit a more accurate allocation of funds based on the numbers and composition of the arriving populations.

The data on secondary migration are based on information submitted by all participating States on refugee and entrant secondary migrants who have resided in the U.S. for 24 months or less, as of September 30, 2009, as verified through matching against RADS. The ORR Data Submission Website has been approved as an OMB data collection instrument which replaces the previous ORR-11 report. (Title: Refugee Data Submission System for Formula Funds Allocations; OMB Control Number: 0970-0043; Expiration Date: 4/30/2012.)

Data submitted by States on asylees served, as verified through matching against RADS data, are used to ensure current information for allocations purposes; ORR includes the number of

certification and eligibility letters issued to trafficking victims during FY 2008 and FY 2009 in the allocations; ORR receives Special Immigrant data for use in the allocations from the Department of State's Worldwide Refugee Admissions Processing System (WRAPS) and from the Department of Homeland Security Customs and Border Protection.

For the final allocations, the total migration data from States' secondary migration files were matched against RADS, yielding in- and out-migration figures for refugees and entrants and a net migration figure for each State. The net migration figure is applied to the State's total arrival figure, resulting in a revised ORR population figure. ORR calculations are developed separately for refugees and entrants and then combined into a total two-year refugee/entrant population for each State. Eligible Amerasians are included in the refugee figures. Cuban and Haitian entrants, Havana Parolees and Cuban Medical Professional Parolees are included in the separate columns in Table 1.

Table 1 (attached) represents the final FY 2010 social service formula allocations. The columns reflect two-year populations, for October 1, 2007, through September 30, 2009, of Refugees (Col. 1), Entrants (Col. 2), Asylees (Col. 3), Cuban Medical Professional Parolees (Col. 4), Havana Parolees (Col. 5), Victims of Trafficking (Col. 6), Iraqi and Afghan Special Immigrants (Col. 7), Total Population (Col. 8), the Final Formula Amount without formula floor (Col. 9), and the Final Formula Allocation with formula floor amounts included (Col. 10).

#### **X. FINAL ALLOCATION AMOUNTS**

Funding subsequent to the publication of this final notice is based on the submission to ORR due on October 30, 2010, of a State Annual Services Plan that is developed on the basis of a local consultative process, as required by 45 C.F.R. 400.11(b)(2) in the ORR regulations.

#### **XI. PAPERWORK REDUCTION ACT**

This notice has reporting and record keeping requirements as approved under OMB Clearance No. 0970-0036, Expiration Date 8/31/2010.
